Essay:Introduction The directions below are representative of what students will encounter on test day. Prompt 4: Solving a problem. Choose this prompt if you have a relevant—and specific! It could be an experience, a person, a book—anything that has had an impact on your life. You're trying to show colleges your best self, so it might seem counterintuitive to willingly acknowledge a time you struggled. When recalling these events, you need to give more than the play-by-play or itinerary. The student responses provided in the following set illustrate common score combinations earned on the redesigned SAT. How do you identify with it, and how has it become personal to you? However, selective colleges receive applications from many worthy students with similar scores and grades—too many to admit. What you write in your application essay or personal statement should not contradict any other part of your application—nor should it repeat it. Prompt 7: Topic of your choice. The admissions committee doesn't need to be convinced they are influential people. Writing fluently and passionately about a book close to you is always better than writing shakily or generally about a book that doesn't inspire you. Make sure you explain how you pursue your interest, as well. Admissions officers have to read an unbelievable number of college essays, most of which are forgettable. It may sound like a chore, and it will certainly take a substantial amount of work. Colleges are looking for curious students, who are thoughtful about the world around them. Whatever topic you land on, the essentials of a standout college essay still stand: 1. You have 50 minutes to read the passage and write an essay in response to the prompt provided inside this booklet. Others write about a subject that they don't care about, but that they think will impress admissions officers. Remember that people who are not familiar with your handwriting will read what you write. Describe the event or accomplishment that shaped you but take care to also show what you learned or how you changed. Be honest and specific when you respond to this question. Being funny is tough.
